## Designing Systems Change Strategies to Address the Social Determinants of Health

In order to build healthy communities and ensure equitable access to affordable, high quality health care, organizations must address the social, economic and environmental systems that influence health. These underlying structural factors directly affect health care access, health outcomes and healthy behaviors.

This workshop is designed to help health and human service professionals, policymakers and funders better understand the potential roles of systems change strategies in improving the health of individuals and communities. The workshop will examine policies, practices and cross-sector partnerships designed to positively impact the social determinants of health. Case studies will examine ways that communities have used systems change strategies and interactive planning activities to address the social determinants of health. Attendees leave the workshop with actionable ideas and tools to take back to their organizations.
